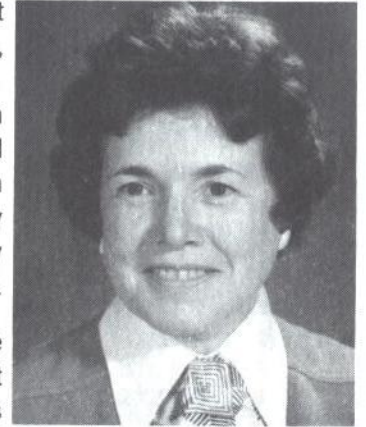

Catherine M. Hartnett

The late Dr. Catherine M. Hartnett was born in Wilmerding, Pennsylvania, the second youngest of eight children. She received college degrees in business administration, history and sociology from Ohio Dominican College (B.S.), Duquesne University (M.A.), Illinois Institute of Technology (M.S.) and Ohio State University (Ph.D.).



Dr. Hartnett came to Albany State College in 1970 as an assistant professor of sociology. In 1980 she was selected chairperson of the Department of Criminal Justice and in 1982, because of her ability and tireless work, she became Director of the Criminal Justice Institute.

During her tenure, Dr. Hartnett developed the curriculum for the undergraduate Criminal Justice Program. She is credited for the concept of the institute and served on the committee charged with overseeing the development of the facility being dedicated today.

Dr. Hartnett received numerous awards, including Outstanding Educator of America and a Fulbright Travel-Study Scholarship. She also held memberships in several professional organizations, including the American Society of Criminology and the American Sociological Association.

Dr. Hartnett was dedicated to community service. She served on the boards of directors for the League of Women Voters, the Liberty House and the Fraternal Organization of Police Associates. Additionally, she was a member of the Community Relations Council, Turner Job Corps and chaired the Legislative Committee of the National Conference of Catholic Women.

The naming of the Catherine M. Hartnett Criminal Justice Building pays tribute to her commitment to education and community service.

Johnnie Mae Gibson

Johnnie M. Gibson has had a distinguished career with the Federal Bureau of Investigation since 1976. Currently assigned to the FBI's Media Services Unit, she is a supervisory agent of Congressional and Public Affairs. Ms. Gibson has held a supervisory position in the Criminal Investigative Division at FBI headquarters in Washington. Her work as an undercover investigator-on-the-street is the focus of a CBS television movie to be released in October. Before joining the FBI she was a high school teacher and a police woman.

Ms. Gibson earned her Bachelor's Degree from Albany State College in 1971. She holds a Master's Degree in Education from Georgia State University. She earned an Associate Degree in Nursing from Chipola Junior College.

A native of Caryville, Florida, Ms. Gibson has been recognized for her outstanding contributions to the black community. She is the recipient of the Community Service Award from the United Black Fund and Black Media, Inc., which paid tribute to her service as a role model in the development and growth of the black community.

In addition to several letters of commendation, Ms. Gibson is an honorary Kentucky Colonel and holds the keys to the City of Louisville.

Ms. Gibson is a member of several professional and civic organizations, including the Capital Press Club, the International Association of Women Police, the National Urban League's Black Executive Program, and the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives.

The Catherine M. Hartnett Criminal Justice Building

The Catherine M. Hartnett Criminal Justice Building is a 3,200 square-foot facility equipped to incorporate modern ideas for quality instruction in Criminal Justice concepts, including research and in-service training.

The three-story building houses a 190-seat capacity lecture room, an amphitheater and a closed-circuit television studio. Work rooms, seminar, computer and data-processing rooms are located throughout the building, which offers individualized office space for graduate students as well as faculty. Laboratories are fully equipped for forensic and general research, and a moot courtroom will be an additional example of the College's commitment to share resources and facilities for the local community.

Lecture rooms are equipped with student response systems; and special interrogation rooms offer observation facilities.

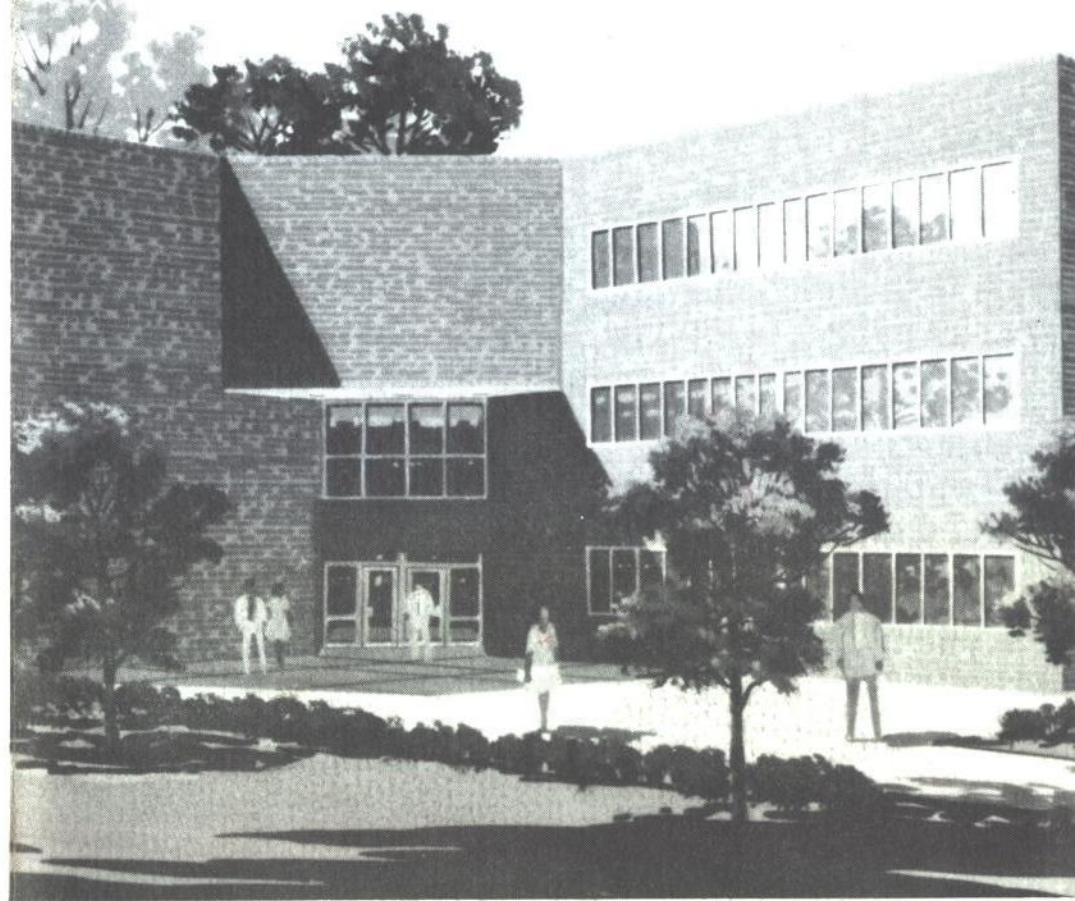
